


Did you know...... that you can now recycle old batteries and stamps in the Mansel Road Centre?

From the Archives



The above advertisement appeared in our Church magazine Wimbledon Presbyterian in 1935. Indeed advertisements for the store appeared regularly throughout the 1930s.

We had been near neighbours of Fielders for ninety-four years so it was sad to see the shop finally close at the end of March. We have had many connections with them as booksellers and stationers and they sponsored a tree at our first Christmas Tree Festival.

Fielders opened at 54 Hill Road in 1928 when the Fielder family took over the business from Alfred E Fricker who had traded there since about 1916. They were therefore one of the longest standing businesses in Wimbledon and all that time the business was run by members of the Fielder family, latterly Ian and Jean.

For many years they were primarily booksellers and many of us will remember browsing through their stock, on two floors. Later, presumably conscious of changing markets, they concentrated mainly on the sale of art materials and supplies.

So another link with pre-War Wimbledon is lost. Elys, Halfhides, which recently closed, and the 'Alexandra' were all founded in 1876. Are there any other Wimbledon businesses that have been open longer than Fielders?

We pray for peace and justice in the Holy Land where the deep-seated division there is spilling over into violence.

We are now seeing the results of the climate crisis, most recently in the floods in South Africa. We pray for the people who have lost their homes and also especially for the scientists and engineers researching the ways in which the rise in temperature can be limited. We pray for the help we all need to play our part, however small, to bring about a change.

We pray especially for young people now hearing about war in Europe, coping with the fears of climate crisis and the effect of the pandemic. Please protect and help them to have the courage and the hope for the future which they deserve. We pray for those trying to help them cope with these anxieties.

Easter is a time for family gatherings, but for many it is another time to cope with being alone. We pray for all of those dealing with loneliness and anxiety. Many of our neighbours are facing illness and bereavement and we pray for them. We pray also for the support services including the NHS and social services trying to help in their very difficult circumstances.

In a moment of silence we pray for everyone who has asked for support and for those known to us who need our prayers........

We continue to work in our church without a minister. We pray for support for all our Elders and members who are working hard to carry out the work of the church.

Dear God, Easter Day brings us hope, help us all to continue throughout the year with the hope that Easter brings us.

All these prayers we bring you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen

The demand for Bible in Ukraine right now is enormous



Bible Society colleagues in Ukraine are supporting the Church as they reach out with Bibles and humanitarian aid, sharing the love and power of God's word. As the crisis around them shocks the world, they continue to serve their communities.

Anatoliy Raychynets of the Ukraine Bible Society said, 'We have met so many people in the last two weeks who have never had a Bible before, but now they are asking for us to pray with them. It is a revival.'

Bible Society colleagues visited Bucha, Hostomel, Irpin, Borodianka and other towns that lie 30–40km from the capital Kyiv. `What we

saw there was truly heartbreaking,' they said. 'Things are worse in reality than they are on TV, and sadly, the situation in Borodianka is even worse than in Bucha. We saw worse devastation and greater atrocities there. 'There is still no electricity,



natural gas, or water in these towns that are just 30–40km outside our capital Kyiv, so people are cooking on fires in their yards and are truly thankful for any humanitarian aid.

'People in these towns, for many days hiding from Russians in cellars without food, are so thankful to receive fresh loaves of bread. But, when they see that we are from the Church, they ask for Bibles. This is in spite of the fact that many of them have never had a Bible before, yet they know that this book can help.'
