We will be sending out invitations and further details but, in the meantime, would appreciate offers of help with transport (to Alan Young at alanjanety@aol.com Please).



Commitment for Life and Christian Aid Week 2022

Our collection for Commitment for Life, the URC's global justice programme, was made during Lent, as in previous years. The total amount received, from online giving and envelopes placed in the pews, was £505. Thank you to everyone who contributed.



We were fortunate this year that once again we were able to share in running the Christian Aid car boot sale on St Mary's Field in Wimbledon Village, and that the weather was kind to us. A good number of cars appeared, and there were plenty of customers. In all the proceeds, from entry money, car charges, and sales from the Christian Aid table





For the house-to-house delivery, this year we repeated the delivery only of envelopes to Trinity's allocated streets that we tried in 2021. Thanks to new volunteer deliverers who came forward, we were able to cover all of the streets.

For the first time people could give online to an electronic envelope ('e-envelope') set up in Trinity's name on Christian Aid's website. Donations given in that way went straight to Christian Aid but were credited to Trinity and could be tracked by us. People could also return envelopes to Trinity's postbox. Although the Trinity e-envelope has not yet closed, the money raised from the envelope delivery and donations stands at £760, made up of receipts directly from the house-to-house delivery of £210, donations of £140 and e-envelope donations of £410. Gift Aid on the house-to-house receipts and donations (an extra 25p on every £ given) amounts to £87.50, making a grand total of £847.50. We have no way of knowing how many of the e-envelope donations were gift aided.

Although the total receipts from the house-to-house delivery are a lot less than in the years before the Covid-19 pandemic, when we collected envelopes from our streets, the known receipts for 2022 are a lot more than for 2021 (£226), and we hope they will increase next year as

people become more used to making donations online. The proceeds of the car boot sale were greater as well (£1,289 in 2021).

Thank you to everyone at Trinity who helped us to achieve those results.

Pre-Covid, taking an offertory was part of our worship during Services, and I hope we will return to doing this again quite soon. Instead, each week we currently have a retiring collection.


Many of you give generously through monthly or other periodic payments directly to Trinity's bank account. That makes claiming Gift Aid tax relief much simpler and that increases every donation from a taxpayer by 25%. As a result, we are not so reliant on Open Plate collections but, obviously, every contribution helps.

It costs £300 per day for Trinity to function.

There are collection plates at the back of the church by the doors for cash gifts or, if you would prefer to use a card, we have a card reader by the font side door. One of the Door Stewards will help you if required.

From the archives



Our picture is of Trinity Presbyterian Church, 340a Clapham Road, Stockwell. What, you might ask has this to do with Trinity, Wimbledon? As it happens, the answer is 'Quite a lot'.

In the later years of the nineteenth century Stockwell was an elegant middle-class suburb, conveniently situated only a couple of miles from the City. It was in this suburb that the Presbyterian Church was built in 1862, a most impressive structure with a 'Bath stone portico of coarse Roman Corinthian columns crowned by a massive pediment'. It flourished, too, with over a thousand members filling its 1035 seats and it became a 'cathedral of south London non-conformity', all the monthly meetings of Presbytery being held in its halls. It had a mission church in Stewarts Road, Battersea.

Mr William Hay Kirkaldy, an Elder at Clapham Road, moved with his family to Worple Road, Wimbledon, and, although he continued to travel to Stockwell twice each Sunday, he saw the need for a Presbyterian Church close to his home. He was one of those who met with 'exiled Scots' to form Trinity Presbyterian Church, Wimbledon.

We don't really know why our Church was called 'Trinity' but it may be that Mr Kirkaldy suggested the name from his love for his old church. Certainly the name was chosen before the first services at Wimbledon were held in January 1884.

The connection did not stop there. Presbytery, anxious to help our infant church, appointed an 'Interim Session' of four men. One of them was Mr. Kirkaldy, who became one of our founding members and was to become our first Session Clerk and Sunday School Superintendent, one came from Wandsworth, but the others were Messrs James Goodman and Robert Morton of Trinity, Clapham. They served for a couple of years until the Wimbledon congregation was strong enough to form its own Session.

The membership of Clapham Road was still over 450 in 1930 with another ninety at the mission, but the area suffered devastating bombing during the War and Stockwell was extensively rebuilt with estates of social housing.

In 1956, when membership had fallen to around fifty, it was decided to close the Church and the buildings were demolished. The site, a couple of hundred yards from Stockwell station, is now occupied by a tool hire company.

Gift Day

One very important charity fundraising at Trinity, **Gift Day**, takes place every November, traditionally on the first Sunday. It goes back a very long way and has become the established way we raise funds for deserving Charities. While the original concept of organising one significant fundraiser at Trinity remains unchanged over the years, there have been some adjustments to the decisions on which charities to support and the amounts distributed.

We introduced the idea of a vote to allow Trinity members and supporters to decide which charities to support. A list of these is distributed in early September by email with paper copies available at Trinity at Sunday services. There is normally a healthy interest in this important collective decision and the feedback on this is positive. The only frustration is deciding between so many charities, all of which are



registered with the Charities Commission and whose objectives are very clear and therefore deserving of the support offered by our Gift Day collection.

The charities are listed on the voting form in three categories - Local, National and International and the ten which receive the most votes each receive £500. In the Local category, four charities are chosen, with three in each of National and International.

The Charities included in the annual vote are those that continue to attract a minimum level of votes. Nominations of new charities are welcome and will be reviewed by the Finance Team - they can be sent to me direct. In making any assessment of new charity nominations, an important aspect is the balance which we try and maintain in ensuring there is no major concentration in any one area of the charity sector.

Gift Day has been generously supported over the years and collections normally reach £10,000 and when Gift Aid is added, our final total regularly exceeds £12,500. Following the distribution of £5,000 to the chosen charities, an allocation of £2,000 is made to enable us make donations during the year to Disaster Relief funds. The remaining funds are distributed to the local Faith in Action charity and Water Aid.

Invitations to donate to Gift Day are sent to members in mid-October and one major change due to Covid is the method of collection. Hopefully we will soon return to collections at Sunday Service which can include Gift Day, but there are many other ways of donating either by sending a cheque, Bank transfer, online through Trinity website or debit card at a Sunday Service.

The gratitude of charities in acknowledging our support is always rewarding to hear and where possible these are shared with you.

I hope Gift Day at Trinity in 2022 will be another year in which we can support so many worthy causes in such a meaningful way.

Firstly, on behalf of Wimbledon Foodbank we want to thank you for your financial support, £500 cheque received. These donations will prove crucial in helping us to continue to serve those who are struggling with food poverty in our community.

Wimbledon Foodbank works with families who are in crisis in the Merton area. For example, families who are coping with the day-to-day financial demands, until a crisis arises such as a broken boiler or a delay in benefits, redundancy could leave the family unable to feed themselves. The Foodbank will provide these families with three days of food and signpost them to the frontline professionals who can help solve the crisis.

250 voucher holders have now signed up and to date over 474 tons of food have been donated. We have now fed 13,700 local people in the last six months, (which is double the whole of last year's figures) many of which are children. These figures were beyond our expectations when opening on $31^{\rm st}$ October 2011.
