#### In memoriam


#### **Ivor Rice-Jones**

Ivor died peacefully at home on 13 August, aged 92.

Married at Trinity in August 1959, Ivor and Moya celebrated fifty-six years of marriage together, before Moya's death in 2015. Ivor became a church member in April 1963, and was ordained to the Eldership in March 1966. From February 2016 he was joint Senior Elder. Together with Moya he was a regular attender at Young Couples, later the Six Group, and for a while took on responsibility for organising Trinity's Christian Aid Week collection and Christmas card distribution in the neighbourhood.

Educated at King's College School, Ivor was a solicitor by profession, working for British Steel.

A much-loved father to Thomas and Matilda, and grandfather to Mariella, George, Eddie, and Matthew, our prayers and sympathy and are extended to all the family at this sad time.

## From the archives

## Come ye thankful people come!



Trinity harvest decoration 1981

In Britain thanks have been given for successful harvests since pagan times. An early harvest festival was celebrated at the beginning of the harvest season on 1<sup>st</sup> August and was called 'Lammas', meaning 'loaf Mass'. Farmers made loaves of bread from the fresh wheat crop and these were given to the local church as Communion bread during a special service.

The modern British tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches began in 1843 when Revd Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Hymns such as 'We plough the fields and scatter' and 'Come ye thankful people come' helped to popularise the services together with the custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce.

When Harvest Thanksgiving was first celebrated in Trinity it is hard to say but it was clearly well-established by 1909 when this report appeared in the church magazine:

The decoration of the church was undertaken by the choir and our hearty thanks are due to the friends who sent gifts of flowers, fruit and vegetables. Especially we are indebted to the Misses Thomson for lending the beautiful palms and other plants with which our Church was adorned. Some of the fruit was sent to the South Wimbledon Cottage Hospital.

Special music was rendered by a full Choir. In the morning Maunder's 'Sing to the Lord of the Harvest' was sung and in the evening Goss's 'O Taste and See.'

In the morning Revd E Miller of Streatham took as his text, 'Praise the Lord O my soul and forget not all his benefits', and in the evening Revd D Macgregor preached on 'Piety in the Home'.

## **Further distribution made to charities**

At the July meeting of Elders' Council it was agreed to distribute the longstanding undistributed monies from past Gift Days. The Finance Team recommended that the £13,749 in the fund should be distributed to three charities – two local and one international: the Wimbledon Foodbank, Faith-in-Action and the Disasters Emergency Committee. Each charity therefore received £4,583.

## To: All members and adherents of United Reformed Churches and our Local Ecumenical Partnerships

Dear Friends,

Is anyone back to normal?

After two years of pandemic and lockdown, and Covid still with us (thankfully, for most, in a much weaker form), we can now worship together in person and find fellowship again. But for most of us it is not simply a return to how it used to be; some people have not returned to church, some have died or become too frail, some churches have closed and others considering it.

Now we have significant European turmoil and its likely effect on fuel and food prices for us in the UK. Thank God that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13 v.8). Whatever else changes, He is our rock, our cornerstone.

Financially, things were extremely tough for churches in 2021. Plate offerings had collapsed; some regular givers had to reduce or entirely stop giving to support God's work; and those churches which hire out their premises had seen income from that source disappear. Even those churches where the majority of the giving was by standing order or bank transfer (*if you have not considered regularising your giving in this way, please do – it helps your treasurer significantly*) may have seen a 20%+ drop in income.

If this had been replicated in giving to the M&M Fund in 2021, we might have been faced with a serious financial crisis last year.

But no, through the generosity of individuals, churches and Synods, we can report that income only fell by 4.4%. With a similar reduction in expenditure the Ministry & Mission (M&M) Fund result was a deficit of only £80,000 (less than one-half of one percent of income), a deficit that can be comfortably covered by reserves.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2021 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

With churches and individuals under financial pressure, 2022 is not going to be an easy year either. The M&M Fund budgeted income (based on Synods' projections) will not be sufficient to cover expected costs and we are reconciled to dipping into our reserves more seriously as a result.

However, if we "ordinary Christians" are to fulfil the call of Jesus to be His witnesses in the world around us we need ministers and other workers "on the ground" and we need shared resources which are often best created centrally. That all comes from the M&M Fund.




Thank you to all those at Trinity who make regular use of our 'contactless' donation device at our Services. It is simple to use with either a debit or credit card, or mobile phone.
