Minister Vacancy: The Good News

I write on 26 June, the day following the 'preaching with a view' weekend, when the congregation had the pleasure of meeting the Revd Jacob Bali, his wife Esther and their young son, Iwan, to ask Jacob questions, and then to hear him preach and lead a service of worship.



The presence of so many Trinity members alongside friends, young people and children, made the experience especially valuable. It was with feelings of real joy and thankfulness that the result of the ballot of church members was announced, and to know that an overwhelming majority of members present and voting had decided to invite Jacob to be Trinity's next minister. It was gratifying to learn quickly on the day that he had accepted the invitation. Many of us present over the weekend became convinced that God had brought Jacob to us, and that he had been calling us and Jacob to ensure a right and happy outcome.

The next step is to achieve concurrence of Southern Synod with our Church Meeting's call and Jacob's acceptance, which is expected to be a formality. Discussions will begin soon with Jacob and the Revd Dr Andrew Prasad, our Interim Moderator, about the terms of Jacob's appointment, and to agree the date and format of a Service of Induction. Details will follow over the coming weeks but this is expected to take place in mid-October.

Trinity began the journey of seeking its next minister more than three years ago. Almost immediately, we found ourselves navigating our way through the pandemic, with all of the uncertainty and change that was

required of us, individually and collectively. We emerged with a clearer idea of what should be our future direction and purpose as a congregation of Christ's disciples, and we have gained some greater resilience and confidence, valuing the contribution that each of us does or could make. And now we have the actual prospect of a talented and inspiring person to lead us spiritually and collaboratively into the future, as we are challenged to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. Good News indeed.

We are indebted not only to the Vacancy Team, but also to Andrew Prasad for his wise counsel and guidance, and not least to Catherine and Sam, our Joint Church Secretaries, for the sustained contribution they have made in leading us through a challenging but nevertheless rewarding period of Trinity's history.

With all good wishes for the rest of the summer!

Collect used stamps for RNIB

Did you know that we collect used postage stamps for the RNIB?

Everybody is invited to donate their stamps which can be left in one of the special boxes that are located in the side lobby at the main entrance to the church and on the reception desk at the Mansel Road Centre entrance.

We are asked to trim stamps with approximately one centimetre of paper around the edge. British and overseas stamps are welcome, including Channel Islands and Isle of Man, which count as foreign, but not large gold Post Office printed labels or pre-printed postage marks.

Update on Traidcraft



Elizabeth Scharinger attended a webinar about the future of Traidcraft on 24 May.....

Traidcraft went into administration at the beginning of 2023 which, for the producers who relied on income from Traidcraft selling their products, was life changing.

Transform Trade have taken over the Traidcraft brand and, while they are not going to replicate the online selling page for products, Traidcraft goods will still be available to purchase on some of their partner websites and therefore the producers will still earn an income.

Transform Trade ____

Thanks to Traidcraft, companies such as Meru Herbs (organic herbs and jams) and Kazi Yetu (Tea producer), to name only two, have been able to:

- Create employment especially to women who would otherwise not have work
- Invest in solar energy
- Help in the fight to end hunger
- Gain Food Safety Certification
- Plant trees
- Install new irrigation systems

From the archives

This map of Wimbledon is dated 1890 so it shows the town in which Trinity was founded and in which it made its early growth.

Trinity itself is marked as a 'chapel' in the incorrectly spelt Mansel Road which, interestingly, is shown as crossing Raymond Road to join Malcolm Road.

There are no buildings on the right hand side going up Wimbledon Hill, Compton Road and Murray Road do not yet exist, 'Georges Road' has not yet been canonised and both Ridgway and Ridgway Place, which does not yet extend beyond the brow of the hill, are also spelt incorrectly.

This was now a growing London suburb rather than a village, growing close to the station.





The cost of living continues to rise and so does the demand for emergency food. The hard times are not over yet, and the Foodbank is in need of your help.


