May Reflection

Greetings Friends,

Have you ever heard the term: a wild goose chase?

The phrase is attributed to William Shakespeare, who originally used it in the play Romeo and Juliet when Romeo accused Mercutio of arguing like a wild goose chase.

Later, the term "wild goose chase" was popularised through hunting as a way to describe when the leader of a hunting party seemed to be taking the group around in circles. In fact, geese could seriously ruin a hunt for a number of reasons. Firstly, they were noisy and would alert the prey to the hunters' approach. Secondly, they were aggressive and known to attack the hunting dogs or even the hunters themselves. Thirdly, they were challenging to catch, evading the hunters' traps with ease and earning a reputation for being as sly as a fox. Worst of all, they were unpredictable, making them even more challenging. Therefore, a wild goose chase was no laughing matter.

However, early Christians revered wild geese as majestic. Even the original Christmas bird was a wild goose, not a turkey. Indeed, for those familiar with Celtic Christianity, the wild goose had another meaning. It represented the Holy Spirit, which may be surprising as we know that a gentle dove normally symbolises the Holy Spirit.

Yet, the early church perceived geese as being vigilant rather than noisy, protective rather than aggressive, intelligent rather than sly like a fox and as for being unpredictable; this is precisely why the wild goose was an appropriate symbol for representing the Holy Spirit. As we read:

"The wind blows where it wills, and you can hear the sound it makes, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes; so it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." (John 3:8)

Following the events of the first Easter and after witnessing the resurrected Jesus, some would accuse the disciples of being led on a wild goose chase, but on one fateful and unpredictable day, the Holy Spirit arrived in spectacular fashion and turned the world upside down (Acts 2). Pentecost marks the 50th day of Easter and the birth of the

Christian Church. Pentecost reminds us that despite appearances, despite the uncertainty and chaos that abounds, God is with us. Indeed, God may appear as gently as a dove or as unpredictably as a wild goose, but one thing is sure: God is with you.



Thy Kingdom Come (TKC) is a global ecumenical prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus.

Since it began in May 2016, God has grown TKC from a dream of possibility into a movement which unites more than a million Christians in prayer, in nearly 90% of countries worldwide, across 85 different denominations and traditions- so that friends and family, neighbours and colleagues might come to faith in Jesus Christ.

Every person, household and church is encouraged to pray during the 11 days in their own way.

Between 10am and 2pm on Saturday 18 May our church will be open to all from Trinity and other local churches and there will be prayer stations around our church building to help people to pray in a variety of ways – with a different focus and artwork at each station.

Week 1 was a week of prep. I was away skiing with the school this week, so I used the journey to research the climate emergency, listen to podcasts and to watch 'Climate Change: The Facts' by David Attenborough. I was also interested to note that the ski resort didn't appear to have recycling bins for general use but there were a lot of solar panels.

Week 2 was Waste Week and I had to make a real effort to be responsible when it comes to my waste. I wasn't allowed to buy anything unnecessary, and I had to try not to waste any food. I also sorted out my wardrobe and mum has sold items that I no longer wear on Vinted.

Week 3 was Food Week where I had to try veggie sausages (I didn't like them!), try soya milk and yoghurt (I didn't like them either!) and visit the Refill Shop in Molesey High Street. I found this very interesting




and the shop owner was very knowledgeable and taught me about natural skincare. He also gave me a vegan chocolate drink to try and it was delicious.

This week I also cooked an organic chocolate cake in the air fryer which was a lot quicker than heating up the oven, so I saved electricity.

Week 4 was Energy Week so I made sure to walk around the house turning off lights. My brother was so bad at leaving his on! The sad death of our Mr Blackman

At the back of the Church there is a simple brass plaque (shown below). Recently somebody asked me about Mr Blackman, and I have investigated.

IN GRATEFUL REMEMBRANCE OF HENRY THOMAS BLACKMAN, CHURCH OFFICER HERE FOR 17 YEARS DIED 20TH OCTOBER 1927, AGED 71. Lord, I have loved the habitation of Thy house.

From the building of the Church in 1886 right up until 1972, Trinity employed a succession of 'Church Officers' - or 'beadles' as they are known in the Church of Scotland. The Church Officers worked long hours, at least six days a week including Sundays, were responsible for opening and closing the buildings for all services and meetings, looking after the boilers, preparing the church for Communion services, keeping the premises, including the grounds, clean, tidy and in good order. They were required to attend upon the Minister at his home every Saturday afternoon at 4pm 'for instructions'. All for £4 a month!

Henry Thomas Blackman began his employment with Trinity in 1910. He and his wife Minnie lived in Pendarves Road, Raynes Park, with their daughters Fanny and Isabella, and became members of the Church. Henry was well-liked and he worked tirelessly for the Church he came to love. Sadly Minnie died in 1916.

On the afternoon of 20 October 1927 Henry Blackman, now aged 71, locked up the church premises after a women's work party at about 6pm. There were no further meetings that day and he made his way

down Raymond Road, probably to catch a bus. As he crossed Worple Road he was knocked down by a car. He was taken to Wimbledon Hospital (then in Thurstan Road) but died on the way there.

The funeral service was held in Trinity and conducted by Revd Dr Macgregor. The procession of the coffin up the aisle was headed by the Joint Session clerks. Dr Macgregor said that Henry Blackman, whose 'efficiency and assiduity in every detail of his work were beyond praise, had left us a good example of faithful service to God and man'. Another of the hundreds of men and women who have served this Church down the years.
