June Reflection

Greetings Friends,

'A strong wind sang sadly as it bent the trees in front of the Hall. A half moon shone through the dark, flying clouds on to the wild and empty moor... It came with the wind through the silence of the night, a long, deep mutter, then a rising howl, and then the sad moan in which it died away. Again and again it sounded, the whole air throbbing with it, strident, wild and menacing... That which is clearly known hath less terror than that which is but hinted at and guessed'.

- Arthur Conan Doyle, The Hound of the Baskervilles (Sherlock Holmes)

I don't know about you, but I love a good detective story. It begins with mystery, intrigue and uncertainty. As the narrative unfolds, the pieces start to connect until you have an 'aha' moment when everything clicks. Suddenly, you realise that all the evidence points to the fact that it was the janitor's girlfriend's cousin's doctor's pet hamster that committed the crime! All the signs are there, and the most inconspicuous suspect had the most obvious motive. Detective stories, whether featuring Sherlock Holmes, Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde, or a more modern tale, possess an intriguing quality.

Two thousand years ago, a remarkable mystery occurred that continues to perplex people today. Thousands of individuals gathered in an open space and had the same inexplicable experience. Allow me to set the scene: following His resurrection, Christ appeared to over 500 people and continued to share the Good News. After giving the disciples the Great Commission, Christ ascended to the right hand of the Father (Matthew 28:18-20, Mark 16:14-20). The disciples were now tasked with fulfilling this mission, but they were not left to do it alone; a helper was coming (John 14:15-31).

On an unsuspecting day, as people gathered to celebrate the Jewish Feast of Shavuot, everything seemed routine and familiar. Tradition and culture blended seamlessly with the festivities. However, on this particular day, something extraordinary occurred: a rush of wind, a gasp of air, whoosh! The Holy Spirit entered the scene. To make it unmistakably clear what was happening, everyone witnessed tongues of fire resting on the heads of the disciples. In an astonishing display, everybody heard the same person speaking in multiple languages at once. It was a miracle, a mystery, and clearly the work of God (Acts 2).

In recent months, the Christian community has been buzzing about what some have called 'The Quiet Revival'. There is a growing realisation that churches across the nation are experiencing significant growth, particularly among those often referred to as the 'missing generation'. This trend spans a wide range of church styles: from evangelical to progressive and from traditional to modern, including evensong. Many have found it surprising that this shift did not occur suddenly; rather, it has been a steady and gradual change happening behind the scenes over the past few years.

Before this news, some people believed that the decline of the Church was inevitable, which led them to make manipulative and questionable decisions based on that assumption. However, while many could only foresee decline, God is bringing about growth. Indeed, where humans saw pessimism and cynicism, God is offering us hope and renewal.

This June, as we celebrate the Church's birthday, Pentecost, may we embrace the journey through moments of stagnation and fatigue, may we confront our own mysteries and uncertainties with hope, and may we hold close the words of Christ, 'And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age' (Matthew 28:20).

Church Family News

Commemorating the 25-year ministry of the Revd Ernest Yu

Ernest came to England from Hong Kong in 1970 as a qualified nurse and pursued further studies to qualify here as a Nurse Educationalist.

With the arrival in the 1990s of the Revd David Foo, a Methodist missionary from Malaysia, Ernest and his late wife Revd Hazel Yu, were able to join with him in

ministry.

In the late 1990s, Ernest and Hazel, together with David Foo, started fellowship worship services at Leatherhead. their home in but. when membership of the group grew to over fifty, they moved to Leatherhead Methodist church, and eventually to Epsom Methodist church.

Ernest and Hazel were both members of Christ Church URC in Leatherhead, and in 2000 Ernest took early retirement from his Senior Lectureship in Healthcare Sciences at Kingston University, and trained for the ministry at Westminster College, Cambridge.

He was ordained and inducted at Trinity on 24 September 2004 and was called to become Associate Minister, with the primary commitment to wider work within the Chinese community.

Ernest was able to use Trinity as a base to bring the gospel to the local people and Chinese people, mainly in the south of England, and built a lively Chinese congregation meeting separately during the second half of our Sunday morning service.

His ministry has involved teaching, preaching and pastoral visits in homes and hospitals, and visits to detainees in the Immigration Removal Centre at Gatwick Airport. He helped non-English speaking Chinese with translations for medical, financial and legal matters, and on occasion accompanied them to hospital or clinic appointments.

Ernest has also been invited regularly to preach in other Chinese churches.

After sixteen years serving the Chinese group at Trinity, Revd Ernest Yu retired as Trinity's Associate Minister on his 75th birthday in 2020, and he was awarded the status of Emeritus Associate Minister.

Since 'retirement' Ernest has continued to preach and lead the Chinese group's service, so that Chinese-language worship continues to be offered each Sunday. He also continues to help other Chinese churches of different denominations in and around London (until recently even as far as Oxford, Woking, Gillingham and Brighton)

It was Ernest who first brought Trinity's Chinese group together, and he has continued to care for its members faithfully. Our Chinese group is recognised as an important and special part of the life of our church, both by the Elders' Council at Trinity and by the URC Southern Synod. Ernest's ministry to the group and to the whole Church has brought great blessing to all of us.

We give thanks to God for Ernest's ministry, and assure him of our prayers and good wishes in his continuing leadership and retirement.

Thy Kingdom Come: 29 May- 8 June




Thy Kingdom Come is a global ecumenical prayer movement that invites Christians around the world to pray from Ascension to Pentecost for more people to come to know Jesus.

The booklets will be available from Trinity on the Sunday before Thy Kingdom Come begins, so that we can all join Christians around the world praying for others to come to know Jesus as Lord and Saviour.


£20 would allow someone with sight loss to get helpful, personalised and friendly advice about a key aspect of daily living from a Sight Loss Adviser.

Children and Young People's News

It has been a busy time for the Children & Youth Work Team and we have more exciting plans ahead. You will have read the report in May's issue of *Trinity News* of the confirmation and reception into membership of three of our young people, which was a real joy to share.

During the Easter Holidays, we also ran a one-day Holiday Club which eleven children attended, five from Junior Church and six of their friends. It was lovely to welcome back friends and meet new ones.

Once again, we used our Brick Church resource to tell the story of Easter, from Holy Week to the Resurrection and enjoyed card-making and other craft activities. There was also, of course, plenty of opportunity to play football and expend some energy.





Brick Church encourages children and young people to think and talk about faith, using Lego to create representations of aspects of the Bible stories we explore. We were impressed with the thoughts and comments that all the children came up with and by their knowledge of the story of Holy Week and Easter.





It has also been great to involve our children and young people in helping to lead worship over the past couple of months. First there was our Mothering Sunday service and, most recently, our Earth Day service. We are always impressed with how well our children and young people participate, from leading the Call to Worship, reading Bible passages and leading prayers. For their part, we hope that it makes them feel valued members of the congregation.

Messy Church: 14 September after the service:



Trinity's Finances and 2024 Accounts

After a spectacular year for Trinity's finances in 2023, last year was rather different. We incurred a deficit on regular activity for the first time (except during the pandemic) since I became Congregational Treasurer in 2012. Moreover, we received no legacies, which are always much appreciated, so had no boost to our capital reserves.



Our income increased by 2%. Planned Giving and Open Plate donations both increased, but Lettings Income from the Mansel Road Centre was 3% down on 2023. As this item contributes half our income, its performance is critical to the overall result. Outside of Covid, this was the first time we have experienced an annual decline in Lettings Income since the Mansel Road Centre opened in 2008. However, it was not for lack of effort by the Lettings team – the market was very difficult.

The 2024 expenditure increased by 12%. A key element for this was a 10% increase in Trinity's contribution to the URC's Ministry & Mission (M&M) Fund,¹ our second largest item of expenditure (see the pie chart below).

In addition, there was an increase in spending on building maintenance and capital projects. The Manse was refurbished so that it was ready for occupation by Jacob, Esther and Iwan, and there was a review of appropriate projects following the windfall legacies received in 2023. A professional feasibility study for the vestibule was commissioned, solar panels were installed on the Mansel Road Centre (MRC) roof and at the Manse, repairs to the brick and stonework on the church's exterior were


¹ The M&M Fund of the URC pays for ministers' stipends, training, Assembly costs and all the central support functions for ministry in the URC across three nations. The M&M Fund's main income is contributions from the churches with some top-up from synods, together with investment income and grants etc.


started, and the woodblock floor in the worship area refurbished. In addition, the sound system in the MRC was renewed.

Overall, Trinity had a deficit of over £80,000 but nearly 60% of that sum came from Restricted Funds. At the start of the year, we had £76,688 in Restricted Funds; these are monies given for specific purposes and so need to be regarded as outside our main capital reserves. At the year end, these had reduced to £15,682. Thus, the refurbishment of the Manse was borne wholly through Restricted Funds and grants from the Southern Synod.

The pie charts show how our income and expenditure is broken down.

While the recurring income & expenditure side remains challenging, Trinity's capital assets are strong. The table shows how they changed in 2024 (including Restricted Funds). Despite all the investment on projects and the annual deficit, unrestricted funds reduced by only £20,688.

We need to make sure we maximise Planned Giving especially where that can be boosted by a Gift Aid tax reclaim (which can increase all gifts from taxpayers by 25%). However, we can still plan to improve and maintain our facilities through our capital reserves.

From the Archives....

There were other local connections with Trinity's architects...

In 1885 architects were invited to submit plans for a proposed new 'Free Library' which was to be built in Wimbledon. The architects that won the competition were the firm of Potts Sulman Hennings. The Library, of course, became a well-known Wimbledon feature, originally surrounded by bushes and an iron fence.


Incidentally in those early days borrowers did not 'browse'. If they wanted to borrow a book, they would tell the librarian the book they wanted and he would fetch it for them.



That same year the recently formed Trinity Presbyterian Church needed an architect to design a proposed hall and church in Mansel Road. The Church Extension Committee recommended Potts Sulman Hennings who were well known to them having recently designed both the Presbyterian church at Highgate and Caterham Congregational Church. Trinity knew them too as

they had worked for David Thomson of nursery fame (see September 2024 *Trinity News*). Although based in Manchester, where they had designed many cotton mills, they had opened a London office at Furnivals Inn, Holborn (where the Prudential building was erected later).

The partnership was made up of Edward Potts, who is credited with the design of over 200 cotton mills, John (later Sir John) Sulman, who in 1885 emigrated to Australia, and Edward William Hennings. It was Hennings who probably worked on the plans for Trinity, and it was he who worked with the Elders and Deacons as, first the (Old) Hall and then the church were built.

The Library opened in 1887 on part of the former nursery land. When an extension to the Library was required in 1901, they turned to Thomson's architect son, Robert, who had been articled to Sulman at Potts Sulman Hennings but who had now set up in business a little further up Hill Road on the corner of Alwyne Road.

The construction of the church was the last connection Trinity had with Potts Sulman Hennings. The firm disbanded in 1891, the architects going their separate ways. Edward Hennings entered into a partnership with Potts' son William in Manchester and died in 1937.
